## Our Interruption by Keara Coughlin

I am not sure if I am in the minority on this, but I am incredibly fascinated with bumper stickers. I do not actually have any on my car, but I will do whatever it takes — short of driving unsafely, of course — to be able to read the stickers on the cars with whom I share the road. Sometimes they make me laugh, sometimes they get me fired up, and

sometimes I end up just plain confused after reading one. Bumper stickers seem to reveal so much about a person in just a short (usually “catchy” or bold) statement. Every now and again, it is the sheer volume of bumper stickers that ends up being the biggest statement of all.

Whether these catchy little statements, words, or images are in support of some politician or screaming out in protest against a particular social trend, these stickers can be fascinating glimpses into how their owners view the world. While a “bumper sticker theology” is, in the end, not a sufficient way to guide one’s journey through life, the power of these little statements lies in their ability to sometimes stop you in your tracks and get you to at least consider there are different ways of looking at the world.

The other day, I saw the following statement from Anne Lamott on a bumper sticker: “You can safely assume that you’ve created God in your own image when it turns out God hates all the same people you do.”

My first thought was, “Wow! That was NOT what I expected.” We have all seen tons of bumper stickers passionately railing against ideologies or particular individuals, but this one stopped me in my tracks because of how directly it challenges our judgments and our own personal theology. This “stop you in your tracks” statement reminded me of the work of a theologian

named Johann Baptist Metz whose political theology was rooted in the sense that when religion is doing its job ... it functions as “interruption.”

Metz believed very deeply that when we craft religion so that it “folds neatly into the prevailing culture” and too easily reconciles and forgets the extreme suffering present in the reality of our context, we fail to honor the heart of Christianity. For Christianity is rooted in the “dangerous memory” of the crucifixion — a horrible, gruesome, detestable act epitomizing injustice and cruelty. It is essential, Metz would say, that we keep this “dangerous memory” of the crucifixion and the “dangerous memories” of all acts of grave injustice that human beings and whole societies have committed (Metz uses the Holocaust as a prime example) in the forefront of our collective consciousness. Far from being obsessed with violence itself, Metz insistence is rooted in the fact we are always faced with the temptation to “forget” the ugly parts of our history (personal and communal) in order to make things more “neat” and allow ourselves to feel more comfortable.

When it is at its best, Christianity works as interruption — calling us to reconsider how we are looking at the world and demanding us to keep the “dangerous memory” of Christ’s Cross (and all the ways the Crucifixion continues to be played out in our day) in our sight. Only when we refuse to allow our religion or faith to be shaped in a way that makes neat what is a very messy existence, only when we choose to actively participate in a Church that continues to challenge us to step out of this “comfort zone” ... only then will we be open to God’s attempts to recreate and reform us in God’s image, and not the other way around.

## Religion's True Birthright by Ronald Rolheiser

*Have you ever thought about the question "What is the greatest task facing the church today?" Or "What should ministry strive to bring about?" Here is a reflection on what I think our task as church is.*

Our task is to try to awaken within people the sense that God exists, that God is alive, and that, because of this, there is a challenge and a consolation that is deeper than they have ever imagined. Our first task in ministry is to tell people they are being held, unconditionally and inescapably, in the hands of a living and loving God and that this God is delighting in them. Before anything else, we need to remind people that God is real and that, because of that, there is a deep goodness and sense to everything, including their own desires, temptations, and tortured sensitivities.

The rest of ministry flows from that. Somewhere, down the line, there will need to be talk, important talk, of church, of dogma, of denominational boundaries, of moral codes, of liturgy and worship, of authority structures and about who should be ordained. But these latter things, all of them, are parasitical by nature, they take their blood out of some other life, in this case, from the life which appears when people realize that they are unconditionally loved and held by the source and origin of all life. As that realization sinks in, it will bring with it, slowly, the awareness that it is, after all, a demanding thing to fall into the hands of a living God and many of the things that Vatican II talked about will then become important issues. But that comes later.

Thus, the task of religion is to evangelize desire, to make the whole world and everyone in it understand existentially the truth and the implications of Augustine's famous prayer: "You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you."

As we look at our world today (and at our own children!) we need to be clear that this is our most important religious task. We need to evangelize our world's desires by revealing the consolation and the challenge of God; otherwise the irresistible physicality, lure, and wildness of pagan beauty will continue to take away both the world's breath and most of its capacity for virtue and worship.

The last quarter century has produced libraries full of valuable scriptural exegesis, good historical correctives to bad theology and corrupt ecclesiology, sensitive moral insights, and every kind of useful suggestion regarding theology and programs for sacraments and liturgy. What it hasn't produced are an effective missiology and effective missionaries for a first-world context.

Yet that is what is perhaps most needed today, missionaries who can evangelize first-world desire. The harvest is ripe, but the Christian labourers (who are on the right track) are few... as is evident from the fact that more and more people are turning to New Age spiritualities, pagan philosophies, and various ideologies in an attempt to make sense out of their eroticism, their restlessness, their innate moral promptings, and their innate grandiosity and religiosity.

The human heart today, as much as in any other age, sincerely yearns for to feel both the consolation and the challenge of God. Offering that is religion's birthright... and it is our first task as a church.

## Saint of the Day

### July 21

### St. Lawrence of Brindisi (1559-1619)

At first glance perhaps the most remarkable quality of Lawrence of Brindisi is his outstanding gift of languages. In addition to a thorough knowledge of his native Italian, he could read and speak Latin, Hebrew, Greek, German, Bohemian, Spanish and French.

He was born on July 22, 1559, and died exactly 60 years later on his birthday in 1619. His parents William and Elizabeth Russo gave him the name of Julius Caesar. When he was just 16, he entered the Capuchin Franciscan Order in Venice and received the name of Lawrence. He completed his studies of philosophy and theology at the University of Padua and was ordained a priest at 23.

His facility for languages made it possible for Lawrence to study the Bible in its original texts. At the request of Pope Clement VIII, he spent much time preaching to the Jews in Italy. So excellent was his knowledge of Hebrew, the rabbis felt sure he was a Jew who had become a Christian. In 1596, the Capuchins completed a 15-volume edition of his writings. Eleven of these 15 contain his sermons, each of which relies chiefly on scriptural quotations to illustrate his teaching.

Lawrence's sensitivity to the needs of people — a trait perhaps unexpected in such a talented scholar — began to surface. He was elected major superior of the Capuchin Franciscan province of Tuscany at the age of 31. Lawrence demonstrated the rare combination of brilliance, human compassion and administrative skills. In rapid succession he was promoted by his fellow Capuchins and in 1602 Lawrence was elected minister general of the Capuchins.

Lawrence was appointed papal emissary and peacemaker, a job that took him to a number of foreign countries. An effort to achieve peace in his native kingdom of Naples took him on a journey to Lisbon to visit the king of Spain. Serious illness in Lisbon took his life in 1619.
